High-tech, tagged fish and anglers will help in Grand River study

A number of Grand River bass have gone high-tech to help the effects of displacement on the movement patterns of smallmouths in the river.

Researchers from the University of Waterloo have implanted transmitters on 20 large fish and others have been tagged with a small, numbered plastic discs attached near the dorsal fins.

"If an angler catches any of these bass, we would appreciate a call," says Christopher Bunt. "Algae may have grown over the tag, but can easily be scraped off to reveal the numbers."

"We're particularly interested in the location, date, tag color and number," added Bunt who also asked anglers to be aware that even though the fish were caught and released in the Grand River, they may enter tributaries such as the Speed and Nith rivers.

As a reward to anglers who help gather scientific data, there will be a draw for \$100 worth of fishing tackle at the end of the study in July 1999.

"We hope the information that anglers provide us will help clarify our understanding of the behavior of smallmouth bass and help us improve the quality of the fishery for many generations to come," said Bunt.

A total of 3,166 salmon and 628 trout were entered over the 16 day derby.
